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Lent is a time to think about commitment, the commitment of love and sacrifice Christ made to and for us for our salvation, and the commitment we are called to make to Christ and to our neighbors in response to that love. A story by Tony Campolo illustrates the nature of that commitment and our tendency to misunderstand and underestimate it.

Soren Kierkegaard tells the story of a fireman. Everybody in town loved the fireman because he was a kind and gentle man. One day he got on the fire truck with the other firemen and headed to the blazing inferno – a building consumed in flames. The fireman saw about 500 townspeople there with little water pistols in their hands. Smiling at one another, they were going “squirt-squirt, squirt-squirt.”

The fireman asked the people what they were doing. They replied, “We all believe in what you are doing and we each came to make our little contribution – squirt-squirt.”

The fireman shouted, “Get out of here. This is no place for well-meaning people who want to make a contribution; this is a place for people who are ready to die to put out the flames.”

This Lenten season we look to one, namely Jesus Christ, who was willing to die to put out the flames, to save us from the flames of sin, death, and hell. This same Jesus calls us to do more than simply believe in what he has done and is doing, as important as that may be. He is also calling us to follow him, to be his disciples and live lives for our neighbors shaped by his own commitment to love and sacrifice for us. He says, “If any want to become by followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.”

Lent stands as a reminder that following Jesus is not an occasional choice, but a life-long calling. It is the kind of life I would not have the courage to attempt on my own. I thank God that I am not called to “make it up as I go,” but rather to follow Jesus along the way.

It’s that time again...you’re thinking Lent but that’s not what I am thinking. I’m thinking First Communion. As I have met with the 5th Grade students and their parent(s), I have noticed the deep interest in participation in this sacrament by the students.

We begin the series of 4 classes by looking at both sacraments—Baptism and Holy Communion. They discuss their own baptism and remember—with their parents—what happened on that day when they became a Christian, a member of the family of God. We then look at the connection between the Passover of the Old Testament and The Last Supper of the New Testament. The fact that the sacrament of Holy Communion has its beginnings in a meal that was celebrated in the Old Testament is important. We then look at the fact that Holy Communion gives many blessings, the most important being forgiveness of sins, which opens the door for life and salvation. We our time together learning how our time together during Sunday worship—as the family of God—centers itself around Holy Communion. We gather around the Table of the Lord.

As we move toward Holy Week and the Maundy Thursday observance, may we all take the time to renew our deep interest in Holy Communion. Remembering that Communion is a sacrament—a sacrament in which Christ is present and that we can be assured of the forgiveness of sins. It is our “means of grace.”

The Hallmark Channel will air a 60-minute version of the award-winning program, "Glory to God Alone: The Life of J.S. Bach," on Palm Sunday, March 20. The documentary will be broadcast at 11:00 AM.

Bach, a well-known German composer regarded by many as one of the finest classical composers ever, lived from 1685 to 1750. He composed vocal, keyboard, and orchestral works.

The expanded documentary production—originally produced in 2003 by Mosaic Television, the video magazine of the ELCA—includes additional video such as performances of some of Bach's music and a new interview with a Bach scholar. It will feature original scenes from Eisenach, Ohrdruf, Weimar, Kothen, Muhlhausen and Leipzig, all in Bach's native Germany.

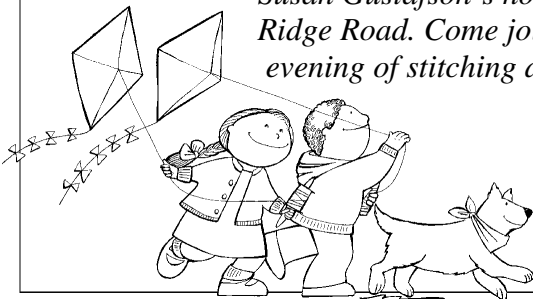

Do We Take Our Wealth For Granted?

As we go about our everyday lives, most of us are thankful of the bountiful opportunities and daily conveniences that we enjoy in the United States. However, it is very easy for us to take for granted our lives of prosperity and comfort. Even though nearly all of us have everything we need, it is easy to desire more because of the wealth that surrounds us in our country. Some statistics from Bread for the World Institute and some other anti-world poverty organizations can help us put our lifestyles in perspective:

1. Today our world is home to 6.39 billion people. In the next 25 years, this population will grow by an additional 2 billion people. Nearly all of these 2 billion people will be born in developing countries.
2. Nearly 852 million people across the world are hungry.
3. The developed or industrialized countries, including the United States, are home to only about 0.9 billion people; less than 1/6th the world's population. There are about 5 billion people living in "developing" countries. Of these five billion people, nearly 1.25 billion must survive on an income of less than \$1 per day – the international poverty level. Can you imagine trying to live on \$365 per year? Nearly 2.8 billion people live on less than \$2 per day.
4. The World Health Organization reports that poor nutrition and calorie deficiencies cause nearly one in three people in the world to die prematurely or have disabilities.
5. In the developing world, 27 percent of children under 5 are moderately to severely under weight. Ten percent are severely underweight. Eight percent of children under five are moderately to severely wasted, or seriously below weight for one's height, and an overwhelming 32 percent are moderately to severely stunted, or seriously below normal height for one's age.
6. Forty-two million people are living with HIV/AIDS in the world – 92.8 percent of them in developing countries. Three million are children under the age of 15. Two point nine million of those children live in the developing world, mostly in Sub-Saharan Africa.
7. About 24,000 people die every day from hunger or hunger-related causes. Three-fourths of the deaths are children under the age of five. (United Nations)
8. Six of the major industrialized countries can spend \$ 700 million in nine days on dog and cat food.
9. Industrialized or developed countries in today's world spend \$ 92 billion on junk food, and \$66 billion on cosmetics, annually. The net wealth of the world's 10 richest billionaires is \$133 billion. Effective debt relief to the world's 20 poorest countries would cost only \$5.5 billion.
10. The cost of completely eradicating world poverty is 1% of global income.

These staggering statistics really hit home, don't they? I don't think that it was God's intention for some to enjoy the nearly limitless fruits of the earth and others to starve to death or die from disease. Please keep some of these "disparities" in the world's wealth in mind throughout this year as we each pray about how to be good stewards of God's riches and blessings, and how we, as a congregation, can do our part to help alleviate world hunger and poverty.

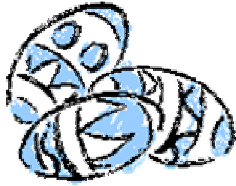
