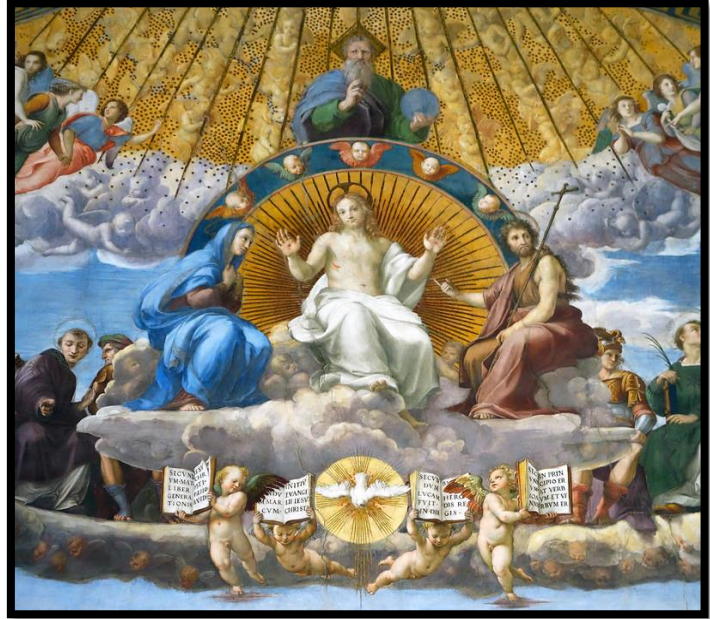

On Sunday, June 4th we will have outdoor worship at Discovery Park in the shelter near the Environmental Center. Worship begins at 10:30 a.m. Zion will provide hamburgers, hot dogs, buns, and condiments as well as lemonade and water. The remainder of the meal will be potluck, so please bring your favorite side dish and/or dessert. Please bring your own chair for seating during worship. We also ask that you bring your own table service - plate, silverware, and a cup. Invite your family, friends, and neighbors to join us for worship and a meal! ## Message from Pastor Willie:

Siblings in Christ – greetings in the name of the crucified and risen one, Jesus the Christ!

Throughout my years in ministry, I have had various comments from parishioners about the texts used in worship and even sermons. One of the more memorable ones occurred in a previous call when a member said, “That was a really good sermon today. It lined up with the scriptures in worship. Whoever wrote that did a really good job.” I responded with a smile, “Thank you. I wrote the sermon.” “Do you write all of the sermons?” “Yes.” “Huh. I thought that the synod gave you the sermons or told you where to buy them. Doesn’t the synod tell you what to preach or the readings to use or something like that?” “Well, sort of. I think you’re talking about the Revised Common Lectionary which we call the ‘RCL.’” “Oh yeah, that’s it. What is the RCL anyway?”

That last question, “What is the RCL anyway?” is a question I encounter more frequently than I ever expected when I started ministry. This expectation is probably one of those assumptions of knowledge I preached about the Sunday after Easter and I was the one doing the assuming because this pastor’s kid grew up with the RCL and knows that the RCL is the three-year cycle of scripture texts that many denominations use in worship. The word “lection” means a selected reading of a text found in a particular book or publication. The Gospel readings for each year come from one of the synoptic (seeing together) gospels of Matthew (Year A), Mark (Year B), and Luke (Year C). The Gospel of John is woven into each of the three years at various points during the church year.

During most of the church year, the lectionary texts consist of a reading from the Old Testament, a Psalm, a reading from the New Testament letters, and a Gospel reading. During Easter season the first reading is often from the Book of Acts rather than the Old Testament. The seasons of the Church Year reflect the life of Christ. Consequently, the Gospel lections for each Sunday provide the focus for that day. The first reading and Psalm are often connected to the theme of the Gospel for the day, while the second reading might have a connection to the theme, but not always.

From these readings, the preacher crafts a sermon in conversation with the texts, often focusing on one of the readings, as well as current context in the community and world. 20<sup>th</sup> century theology Karl Barth is famous for having said that “You preach with a Bible in one hand and a newspaper in the other. But interpret newspapers from your Bible.” The preacher’s job is to preach the living Word of God, the crucified and risen Christ, to the congregation.

While this is a short explanation of the Revised Common Lectionary, whence do we receive this cycle of readings for worship? Well, that answer is a little more complicated, but I’ll provide a summary version. The Revised Common Lectionary was first published in 1992 and is a revision of the Common Lectionary, first published in 1983.

## Message from Pastor Willie Cont'd):

Both of these lectionaries are based on the Ordo Lectionem Missae, a Roman Catholic lectionary published in 1969 after the Second Vatican Council, which was a series of meetings of the Roman Catholic Church from 1962-1965 which made ground-breaking changes to the Roman Catholic Church in many and various ways. Including this new lectionary upon which the Common Lectionary and Revised Common Lectionary are based. The RCL as we currently know it was developed by the Consultation on Common Texts (CCT), an ecumenical group of liturgical scholars and denominational representatives from the United States and Canada who worked together to publish the RCL for use in Christian churches throughout the world.

The RCL is the most recent of many and various lectionaries throughout the history of the Christian Church and is used by more denominations throughout the world than any other lectionary in history. The RCL is currently used by more than two dozen mainline denominations in the United States, Canada. It is also used by many of our ecumenical partners across the world. This helps keep the body of Christ united as we worship in many different places, but all hear the Word of God together as we gather for worship.

So, if you are in worship and you feel like you have heard the scripture readings before, you have. Three years ago, on that same Sunday of the Church year!

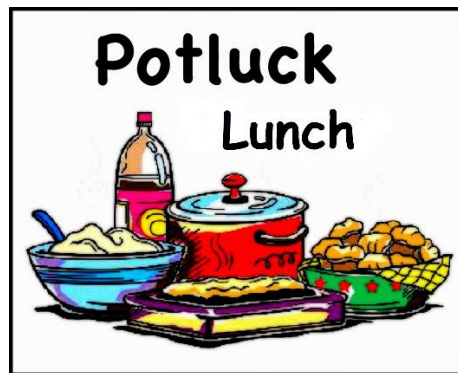

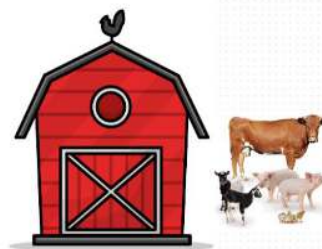

- Responding to a recommendation from the Worship Committee, the Church Council has scheduled three Sunday night services this summer. Those dates are June 18, July 9, and July 30. The services will start at 6:00 p.m. If these services are well attended, there is a possibility of two more Sunday night services in August.
- Thank you to Gail Pusateri and Leslie Watson for volunteering to compile a list of volunteers to be servers for future funeral lunches.
- Have you noticed the bathroom doors of Zion being propped open with doorstops? It was noted that numerous members had problems getting walkers and wheelchairs through the doors into the restrooms. Please follow the directions on the door signs and leave the doors open. Access should be much easier for everyone now.
- The Church Council has asked the Parish Education and Worship committees to come up with a plan for a proposed Pray Ground for children in the area of the front pews on the right side of the sanctuary.
- Thank you to Dave Pusateri for heading up a group of men to replace the mulch on the Sycamore side of the church building. On May 15, a dump truck from Eastern Iowa Landscaping unloaded 4.5 cubic yards of mulch on the sidewalk leading up to the Fellowship double doors at 9:00 a.m. By 10:00 the new mulch was in place. Those helping were Mike Watson, Pastor Willie, Jim Haage, and Dave Pusateri.



## Spanning the Generations

Long ago, before the internet and Ancestry.com sites, the church was a place where people could research their family histories through the baptism, confirmation, marriage, and funeral records. Our church receives a few requests each year for this type of information and looking back through all of the files and official ledgers can be a daunting task. So, I volunteered to input the handwritten and typed historical documents into a spreadsheet to allow for an easier search and retrieval of information.

Although this project has a long way to go, through the use of several types of documents and the huge support and assistance of Sheryl Mercer, we have information on confirmations back to 1885, funerals back to 1919, baptisms back to 1904 and marriages on back to 1914. We have the listing of the Zion School 8th grade graduates from 1942 until the school closed in 1962. We have the listing of Church Elders and then Council Presidents back to 1932.

Sheryl is still searching the Church, one bookcase and file at a time, for information that will help fill in some of the blanks. Maybe you can help. Over the next several months, we will be reaching out to you to locate information to help complete this project. Currently, we ask that you please look through your family documents and see if you have any information on the items listed below.

**Missing Church Elder or Council President Names** - We have not yet found any information of Church Elders before 1932. Additionally, the annual reports for 1961, 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1974 did not contain the names of the Council.

**Presidents. Zion Lutheran School** - We have not yet found any information on the graduates from 1920 - 1942. **Zion Annual Reports** - We have copies (both paper and electronic) for all annual reports starting from 1920 through 2022 except 1925, 1926, 1927 and 1931.

We have also found several older documents that we believe are types of annual reports but are written in German. So, we are looking for anyone who can read German at least to the proficiency of helping us identify what type of document we have. Later this year, we will begin to use the showcase in the Fellowship Hall to display some of the archival information we have found including spotlighting multi-generational families of Zion.

Please drop off anything you find; we promise to make a copy and return the document to you in a timely manner. Thank you for your assistance.

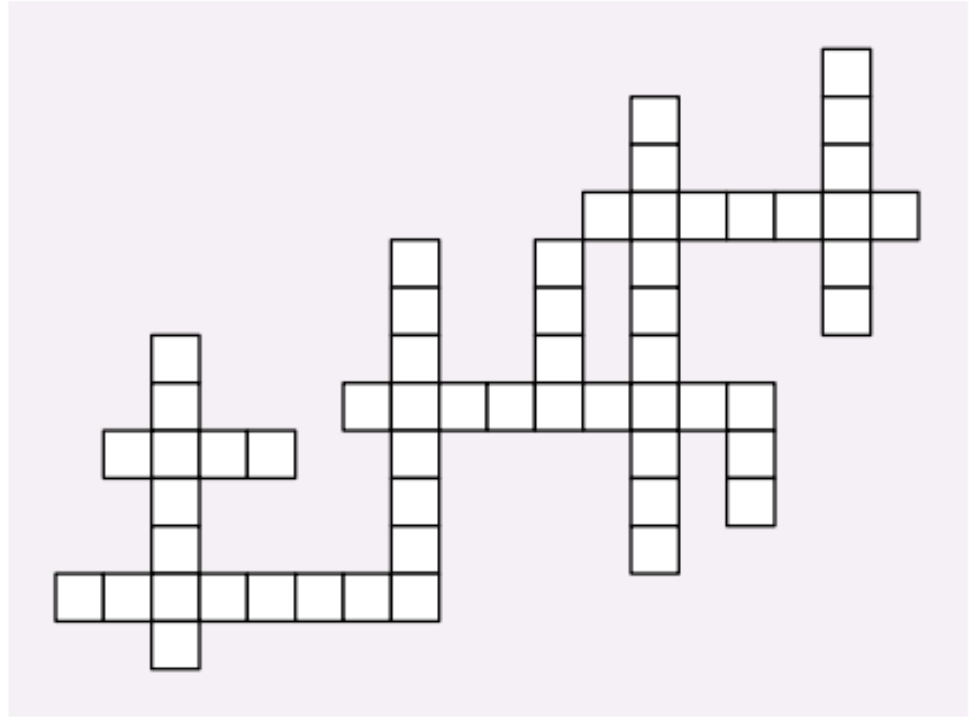

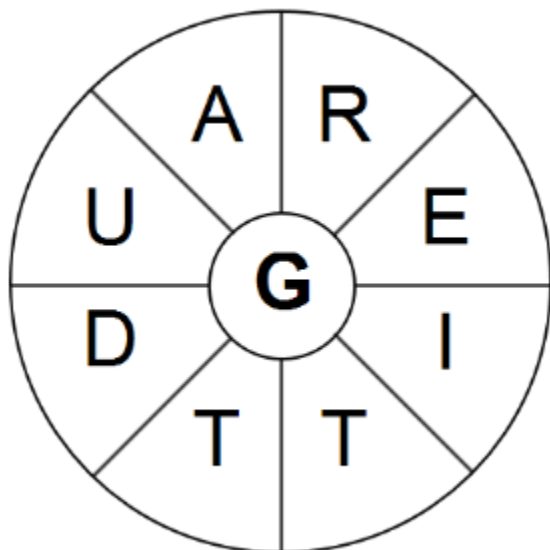
