

Message from Pastor Willie:

Great Expectations

The longer that I am a husband, dad, and pastor, the more I refine my theory of expectations, which includes an expectation equation. My theory of expectations goes like this. Much of life, especially lived in relationships, involves managing expectations. I attempt to manage my wife's expectations, my children's expectations, congregational expectations, and my own expectations. The challenge of this balancing act occurs when these expectations intersect and sometimes conflict with one another – sometimes I refer to it as "a lot of plates spinning on a lot of different sticks".

For example, I love to fish. Yet I have not wet a line since sometime back in May. Why? Because of schedules and expectations. As an ordained minister of Word and Sacrament, I am expected to do such things as prepare worship services, write sermons, visit the sick and dying, bury the dead, preside at weddings, baptize those who desire baptism, serve Holy Communion, and provide pastoral care to those in need, not to mention leading worship every week. If I have free time when I have the expectations of my call to ministry satisfied, then I could think about going fishing, right? However, our kids are involved in various activities. When the weather is favorable for fishing, they really want to go swimming. In the evening, when I would LOVE to be fishing for bluegills around sundown, that is bedtime in our house and bedtime normally takes all hands on deck. By the time the kids fall asleep it is too late to go fishing. And let's not forget about the garden I need to tend as well. So I have met the expectations of the congregation, my wife, and my children while my expectation of going fishing goes unsatisfied.

However, I am not upset about this. Why? Because I have managed not only those expectations, but also my own expectations. My hopeful expectation to go fishing is tempered by the realization that I am accountable to more than just myself. So if I do not actually expect to go fishing, I will not experience disappointment about that expectation not coming to fruition.

This is where the expectation equation comes into play. The difference between expectation and reality is either the level of frustration/disappointment or the level of joy experienced. If my expectation is that I would go fishing four nights per week, I will spend my entire life frustrated beyond measure. Because that simply will not happen. If I expect to go fishing a couple of times per month, that expectation is realistic. With the realistic expectation in place, if I get out twice in one week, then I experience joy because I will have exceeded my expectations!

Expectations occur in any relationship. When we clearly communicate expectations and set realistic expectations, the relationship can be healthy and life-giving. When expectations are unrealistic, the relationship can be dysfunctional and life-draining. If you find yourself frustrated or disappointed with yourself or someone else or if someone is frustrated or

disappointed with you, ask yourself, "Are the expectations here realistic?" If we do not set realistic expectations for ourselves and others, we cannot possibly experience the satisfaction of those expectations being met. Be realistic, patient, and forgiving with those for whom you have great expectations. Even and especially with yourself.

August 2023, LSI Bulletin/Newsletter Article Back to School Month

Saying goodbye to summer and transitioning into a new school year can be a difficult time for many adolescents, especially those with emotional or behavioral disorders. LSI has 27 therapists that provide mental health counseling to individuals of all ages through in-person therapy in over 20 locations across the state and virtual therapy in all 99 counties. In 2022, our Clinical Services team served more than 1,000 clients, totaling 14,000+ therapy sessions for Iowans of all ages.

In addition, our Behavioral Health Intervention Services team wraps care around a child's entire family to empower them with skills like anger management, healthy decision-making and problem-solving. In 2022, the BHIS team served over 250 clients, resulting in more than 3,900 therapy sessions for children and their families.

Through LSI's Trauma Informed Care program at the Juvenile Detention Center in Waterloo, ourstaff work with the teens by completing trauma assessments on each adolescent and providing summary to their juvenile court officers. The LSI staff also facilitate both individual and group therapy sessions with the teens to help them deal with their trauma and work through it in a productive way.
