Maundy Thursday

With Maundy Thursday commemorating the Last Supper, Christian denominations who observe this day universally celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion, which they teach was instituted by Jesus on this night. In the Catholic Church, the Lutheran Church and in certain Anglican congregations, the Mass of the Lord's Supper begins as usual, but the Gloria is accompanied by the ringing of church bells, which are then silent until the Easter Vigil.

In many mainline Protestant denominations, the stripping of the altar and other items on the chancel also occurs, as a preparation for the somber Good Friday service. The stripping of the altar represents the abandonment of Jesus by his disciples and the stripping of Jesus by the soldiers before his crucifixion.



Message from Pastor Willie:

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." - Isaiah 43:19

Back on March 13th I put the first seeds into the ground in my garden for the 2025 growing season – not counting the 800ish cloves of garlic I plugged in the ground at the end on October 28, 2024. Every time I plant seeds I participate in the practice of hope. I hope that the garlic cloves I set aside for seed last year are healthy and disease-free and pest-free. I hope that the seeds I used this year, which are at least several years old, will germinate. I hope that IF they germinate when they should that a freeze does not kill off the tender new shoots. This past Sunday morning, as the temperature dipped to 26 F at our house I panicked as I forgot to bring my pepper and tomato seedlings in from the deck where I had set them the day before to get some good sunlight and exposure to wind to strengthen the stems and acclimate them to outside conditions. As I left the house for worship, I hoped that I would return to see that the tomatoes and peppers had recovered from the cold – and they did.

As we enter the vibrant season of spring, we are invited to witness the miracle of new life. The earth, once barren and cold, is coming alive again—flowers bloom, trees bud, and the air is filled with the sounds of renewal. We can see this right outside Zion in the beauty of the magnolia tree and daffodil blooms when you drive into the parking lot. This season mirrors the resurrection hope we celebrate in Christ, reminding us that no matter how dark or desolate life may seem, God is always at work bringing new life.

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." (Isaiah 43:19)

Here, God promises to create something new—a way through the wilderness, rivers in the desert, reminding God's people of God's steadfast faithfulness and providence. Just as the spring season breaks the stillness of winter with new growth, God is constantly at work in our lives, even in places that seem lifeless.

We will celebrate this theme of new life when we gather on Easter to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ with shouts and songs of that "A" word we omit from the liturgy and scripture readings in the season of Lent. In this ultimate act of renewal, God broke through the despair of death and sin, bringing forth new life for all who believe. The resurrection is the ultimate "new thing" God has done—a promise that in Christ, death is not the end. It is a passage to new and eternal life.

As we celebrate Easter, we are reminded that, through Christ, God is making all things new. The same God who brought water to the desert and parted the Red Sea for Israel's deliverance from Egypt is now bringing life and hope through the resurrection. Christ's victory over death gives us the confidence to face our own challenges with the assurance that God is always working to bring new life out of old struggles. In the springtime of our faith, we are called to recognize the new things God is doing in our lives and in the world around us. Perhaps it's a renewed sense of purpose, a new opportunity for growth, or the restoration of a relationship once thought lost. Whatever it is, we are invited to see God's hand at work, to embrace the hope of resurrection, and to share that hope with others. Let this season of spring remind us that, no matter how dry or difficult life may seem, God is always at work bringing new life. In Christ, all things are made new.



LSI Article and Story



LSI serves Iowans of all ages; from families with newborns navigating parenthood, to Refugee and Immigrant elders, and children of all ages. One of the most vital populations LSI supports is young parents, especially those navigating the challenges of early motherhood. Cheyenne F., a Family Support Specialist for LSI's Healthy Families America (HOPES) program, shares the impactful work she's doing with young mothers in need of support.

She shares that she had the privilege of working closely with NF, a young mom who has shown incredible growth and resilience.

The Healthy Families America (HOPES) program is an evidence-based child abuse prevention program that provides support to prenatal families and families with children ages o-5. LSI's Family Support Specialists work with families like NF's to provide the guidance and resources needed to break cycles of abuse and neglect and build strong, healthy foundations for children and parents alike.

NF's journey began in June 2023 when she reached out for help. At 19 years old and pregnant, NF was living in Muscatine County and knew she needed extra parenting support. Through the HOPES program, Cheyenne began building rapport with NF right away and learned about NF's challenging upbringing, which included bouncing from foster home to foster home starting at age 6.

"NF had faced so much inconsistency and pain in her early years," shared Cheyenne. "It was clear that she had a lot of unresolved trauma, but it was equally clear that she wanted to make a positive change in her life, especially for her baby."

Throughout the course of their work together, Cheyenne and NF focused on building trust and creating a safe space for NF to share her experiences and challenges. NF revealed that after High School, she fell into a pattern of poor choices, including run-ins with the law. NF got pregnant, and although she knew the father, he didn't want to be involved in her pregnancy or her life. Despite this, she had two strong support networks: her foster parents and her current roommate.

Cheyenne shares that NF struggled with controlling her behavior, and she feared she might end up back in jail, which unfortunately happened. When she was incarcerated, Cheyenne made sure to stay in contact with her foster parents and provided them with regular updates and support.

When NF was released from jail, she confided in Cheyenne that she was considering running away with her baby, which prompted Cheyenne to share valuable resources with her to support her mental health, housing, and employment.

"I knew that if NF ran, it could jeopardize the progress we had made. But with the right guidance and resources, NF began to see a different path forward," Chevenne shared.

Cheyenne expressed her excitement about NF's progress stating, "NF has made such huge strides. She started attending therapy twice a week and has also found a job at a local consignment store. She's enrolled in anger management classes and is committed to creating a better future for herself and her baby."

Today, NF's baby is thriving, meeting all developmental milestones. NF continues to meet regularly with Cheyenne and enjoys engaging in evidence-based activities that are tailored to her needs as a young mother. "I'm so thankful for the HOPES program. I don't know where I'd be without the support of Cheyenne," NF shared.

It's stories like NF's that remind us why the work we do is so important. With the right support, anything is possible.
